This year's chosen theme, "So I Send You" (John 20:21,) reminds us that we are called to act for positive changes for the youth of our community, nation, and world.

On June 12, St. Andrew will receive the Pentecost Offering, one of the four annual churchwide special offerings of the PCUSA. This offering provides support for programs that serve children at risk as well as providing leadership development opportunities for youth and young adults. Look for special inserts highlighting the offering in the next four Sunday's bulletins.

St. Andrew will retain forty percent of the Pentecost Offering to meet local needs. The remaining 60% will be sent to General Assembly to support programs that minister to youth and young adults and advocate for children at risk. Since 1998, Presbyterians of all ages have raised over \$8 million for ministries that benefit younger members of God's family.

Great Hymn-Writers of the Church: Harry Emerson Fosdick

1878-1969

Baptist

Born in 1878 in Buffalo, New York, Fosdick, a pastor and true revolutionary in his day, received his B.A. from Colgate University in 1900 where he was class poet, cheerleader, and recipient of five major awards. He went on to Colgate Divinity School and then to Union Theological Seminary where he earned a divinity degree in 1904. He later received a M.A. from Columbia.

Though he was "born again" at the age of seven, he was a staunch liberal and an adamant foe of fundamentalism. Fosdick became a central figure in the Fundamentalist-Modernist Controversy within American Protestantism in the 1920s and 1930s. From 1918 to 1925, Fosdick, though a Baptist, served as minister of First Presbyterian Church in New York, where his eloquence earned him a favorable reputation among liberals and conservatives alike. Fosdick authored numerous books as well as many hymns. Perhaps his best-known hymn is *God of Grace and God of Glory* which he wrote in 1930. Harry Emerson Fosdick died in 1969.

From Our Parish Nurse: Fresh Breath, Less Gum Disease, or a Waste of Money?

Last year the FDA warned three mouthwash manufacturers to stop suggesting that their products that have fluoride as the main ingredient would prevent gum disease and remove dental plaque. Several years ago a federal judge ordered the manufacturer of Listerine to stop an ad campaign that said the mouthwash was as effective as flossing for preventing tooth and gum disease. The fact is that mouthwash plays a fairly minor role in the prevention of plaque and gum disease. Brushing and flossing are much more important.

Mouthwash has a history that goes back thousands of years (early rinses were made with betel leaves and dill and myrrh dissolved in white wine). Listerine was first developed as a surgical antiseptic but began to be sold as a solution to bad breath (and as a floor cleaner and a cure for dandruff!) in the 1920s. Experiments in the 1930s showed that gingivitis developed in a matter of weeks in the absence of oral hygiene. Many of the mouthwashes today are highly artificial concoctions that contain sweeteners such as saccharin for taste and artificial colorings for variety. Alcohol is often included because it keeps other ingredients in solution and tends to accentuate the flavor.

Mouthwash will make your breath smell better for some period of time. The question is whether that is achieved by ingredients that kill off bacteria/germs or by strong flavors that merely mask the problem, as a breath mint does. Using a toothbrush in a small area near the back of the tongue is more effective than rinsing with a mouthwash. A recent review of the existing research concluded that two of the antibacterial agents most commonly used *may* reduce the levels of halitosis-producing bacteria and other ingredients may neutralize smelly sulfur compounds.

Bacteria cause both cavities and gum disease, but the species that cause cavities are

different from those that cause gum disease. Those that cause gum disease interact with gum tissue, causing inflammation, which can break down gum tissue as well as the bone that holds teeth in place. Some people are more susceptible to gum disease but accumulated plaque makes it more likely. Brushing and flossing is the best way to remove it, although the antibacterial ingredients in mouthwash do have a modest effect. The conventional mouthwashes do not prevent cavities, nor do they claim to. However, there are mouthwashes on the market that contain fluoride and some of them have the ADA's blessing as proven cavity fighters.

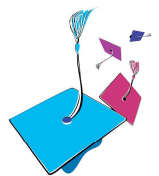
Session Highlights – April 26
